I am proud of the accomplishments of the Wood Buffalo Regional Library over the past year. Over the past year, we added thousands of items to our physical collection, expanded access to online resources including learning platforms, and expanded our Tech to Go program ensuring that everyone, regardless of economic means, has access to information and technology that is essential in today's world.

As you review the many accomplishments of the WBRL, I hope you are excited as I am about the future of our Library and community.

Thank you to our staff and volunteers, funders and sponsors, and all our community partners who make it possible to do what we do every day.

PROMOTE CREATIVE EXPRESSION AND FOSTER AN ENGAGED COMMUNITY

2022 saw many opportunities for community members to expand their creativity and build connections through WBRL programs and services!

As of April 2022, WBRL returned to a fully in-person program calendar for the first time since March 2020; we offered 155 in-house programs focused specifically on creating for 1,869 children, teen, and adult participants. Programs included our popular weekly STEM Lab programs for children ages 6-8 and Tween Create for children ages 9-12. In response to demand, we have doubled STEM Lab to twice a week in 2023!

Words in Motion

Each year, in celebration of National Poetry Month, WBRL invites local wordsmiths to submit their original poems for the Words in Motion Poetry Contest. In 2022, 50 poems were selected for a regional poetry booklet and honored at our launch event in April.

Arts & LitFest

WBRL held Arts & LitFest in September during Alberta Culture Days, including an all-day Kids' Event, a Writers' Panel, and Tween and Teen Art Workshops. Programs featured a variety of local talent sharing their culture and skills: three storytellers, three authors, and four artists.

A main outcome objective of programming and events at WBRL is to develop community connection; through a fun activity or a shared passion, we build friendships and deepen engagement in the region. In a community survey, 93% of respondents indicated they feel more connected to people in their community as a result of participating in a WBRL program.







REDUCE BARRIERS FOR TEENS AND ADULTS TO ACCESS INFORMATION AND LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

Through our extensive collections of materials and online resources, WBRL supports the region in accessing information freely and easily. In January 2022, the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo Library Board eliminated extended use fees, a significant barrier to access for many community members, especially those who are lower-income.

In 2022, we added 9,796 items to the physical collection, including books, DVDs, Blu-Rays, and more, to meet the informational needs of the region. Physical resources circulated over 240,000 times.

Online resources, including eBooks, eAudiobooks, digital newspapers and digital magazines, continued to be a popular option for many community members post-pandemic, with over 60,000 circulations. Online learning platforms such as Solaro, Consumer Reports, and Auto Repair Source also provided valuable information to the region.

Programs for teens and adults offered unique learning opportunities. WBRL continued our partnership with Keyano College to offer the Keyano Lecture Series and Junior Achievement developed entrepreneurial skills in teens over 16 sessions.

WBRL expanded our circulating technology collection with Tech to Go (launched in June) and Internet to Go (launched in September). Through Tech to Go, cardholders can borrow mobile technologies including Chromebooks, Lenovo Laptops, MacBooks, and iPads. Internet to Go, allows patrons to borrow mobile WiFi hubs for at-home use. Electronic equipment circulated 249 times in 2022.

NURTURE AN INCLUSIVE AND INFORMED COMMUNITY

WBRL continues to champion inclusivity and intellectual freedom. 2022 saw increased challenges to 2SLGBTQIA+ programs and materials at public libraries across Canada; for our part, WBRL reaffirmed our commitment to safe, inclusive spaces and services for the region's LGBTQ+ community and our ongoing programming collaborations with Pride YMM. Our October Story Time at the End of the Rainbow featuring Simma Downe saw our highest numbers ever, with 90 children and parents in attendance.

Other programs also focused on meeting diverse needs and fostering inclusivity, including Afternoon Activities, our weekly program for teens and adults with disabilities, and the English Language Learners for Foreign Workers Conversation Group offered in partnership with the YMCA.

Our addition of Beanstack, an online reading challenge app, offered new opportunities to encourage reading diversely. #ReadWoke, a challenge for teens, aims to expand awareness of marginalized perspectives and experiences. To date, 52 teens have signed up.

It's Time to Read

WBRL is pleased to partner with the Regional Municipality of Wood Buffalo Indigenous and Rural Relations Department on It's Time to Read, an Indigenous-focused book club. Over the course of 2022, we offered four virtual book discussions on titles written by Indigenous authors. This ongoing initiative seeks to expand awareness of Indigenous culture and history and the ongoing impacts of colonization on Indigenous Peoples. To date, over 100 people have joined the It's Time to Read Facebook group.







EXPAND BEYOND THE PHYSICAL SPACE TO CONNECT WITH THE ENTIRE WOOD BUFFALO REGION

WBRL aims to bring library services to the entire region through rural and outreach initiatives.

In 2022, WBRL staff visited rural communities (Anzac, Conklin, Fort Chipewyan, Fort McKay, Fort McMurray 468 First Nation, and Janvier) over 80 times for programs, material delivery, and take-and-make kit drop off. Over 9,000 participants took part in WBRL programming, either in person or through a take-and-make kit during ongoing COVID-19 restrictions.

WBRL continued to offer material delivery to rural communities via community lockers or mail. Holds for rural delivery can be placed on any of our collection items in our online catalogue facilitating access to information and resources throughout the region.

In 2022, we also piloted a rural computer service with laptops and printing services. This state-of-the-art computer kit can be booked by organizations or individuals in any rural community.

Within Fort McMurray, outreach programming delivers service to vulnerable populations who may not be able to visit the library facility. In collaboration with other agencies like the Northern Lights Regional Health Centre, Willow Square, Stepping Stones Youth Services, and Centre of Hope, WBRL meets community members where they are.
